



SRIA process – a process of co-creation






City representatives, urban stakeholders and actors defining practical demands and opportunities based on their strategies

Consultation


Public consultation on the final SRIA concept and priorities to raise awareness and test the robustness and relevance of the SRIA research and innovation concept.

Conclusions


- For supporting the SRIA implementation, **continuous strategic dialogue** with stakeholder groups of science, cities, civil society and business (industry) is needed to ensure **inter- and transdisciplinarity.**
- The different logics of various stakeholders should be taken into account
- A broad and flexible connection to local, national and European contexts and different stakeholders is seen as the best way forward

 Going beyond advisory boards, a co-creation process is needed to connect the various stakeholder groups effectively






Role of the Stakeholder Involvement Platform (SIP) for the SRIA implementation





SIP concept

- Establishing a core panel representing all stakeholder groups with sufficient regional spread across Europe
- Setting up a process that involves the different stakeholder groups according to their logic and the related question
- Complementing this European level approach with national consultations to mobilise, involve and inform the national communities
- Building up a stakeholder database for dissemination
